Message from Soul Station

We celebrated a successful Christmas Angel Mission 2023. Christmas Angel Sacks were delivered to 10 local Infant, Junior, and High schools, as well as 2 nurseries in our Community. Each sack was brimming with delightful gifts, fulfilling every Christmas wishlist and tailored to each child who was going through difficult times. They were all packed with the same care and attention I'd give to my own children.

We also supported children through our family support workers,

including children going into care. Our last sacks went out three days before Christmas.

'My gorgeous 13-year-old boy, on Thursday after school for HOURS spent time helping me carefully and thoughtfully select gifts for children to put in each sack based on a child's preference. For a boy who doesn't always connect with the world, he was fully connected to the task in hand, and we had some really meaningful conversations about



when times are tough for people. He was very insightful, saying, 'I think it matters so much what to put in (each sack). If this is all they get, I mean come on, it must mean a lot to their moms. I like to know we've made Christmas special for them.'

After every bag, he said, 'Come on, just one more. 'Until the wee hours, we did it together. For me, the Christmas Angel Mission goes back to the phrase in the Bible: 'What You do unto others, you do to me' and that's why I do the Christmas Angel Mission.

I know we are wonderfully created in His image, and what is a more precious loving moment than children opening gifts and enjoying Christmas, a day that's so important to us as Christians? This is what I want to teach my children, that our actions count, how we are with



other people, and how we help and serve when we can glorify not ourselves but God.

The world can be cruel, and it can be hard, so making a small difference to ensure someone else has a happy moment means a lot. So thank You for supporting us. I had budgeted and planned really well and wasn't expecting the large church donation.

What's that phrase? 'God will provide.' One of the schools, one we hadn't supported before, reached out to us after the deadline, with several young people who were going through a tough time, when all the budget had been allocated. It was because of your unexpected generous donation, I could say Yes, fulfil their requests and help those teenagers who I'm sure know how much their

families are struggling. Harder to hide it from them when times are tough.


I got some great discounts and was able to spread the donations much further than expected, not only helping the teens but the younger children too who were referred from the family support workers.




