Walking in the pouring rain

Hello,

Have you ever been caught in a massive downpour, one of those sudden, devastating showers that leaves you absolutely sodden? I can't believe for a moment that none of you are exempt from this experience, in fact I wonder who has the most exotic tale to tell?

Years ago I lived in Galway and learnt first-hand the reason for the beautiful lush green Irish landscapes (and also one of the explanations as to why the pubs were so full every afternoon!). The rain there was of a different league, many times I saw it rain on just one side of the street; it sometimes felt like it had been pre ordered for certain locations. If you have never seen that happen, you are missing out on one of nature's beautiful wonders.

One summer whilst I was working the festival circuit, 90% of the gigs were cancelled due to rain. I can't remember the exact year but it was around the early 2000s, a summer of mud and puddles, and the start of my umbrella selling empire. It got to the point where you were surprised to be working, often spending the day sat in a field trying to console the organisers.

However, by the end of that summer we had created a number of shows that could work in any weather; necessity truly is the mother of invention. I am now quite notorious amongst fellow performers for continuing with a show regardless of any deluge, my mantra being that if any of the audience are prepared to stay, "I will deliver a show". In fact some of these are amongst the most memorable and enjoyable performances I have ever done. There is some kind of extra connection felt amongst those present, as sense of facing the issue head on and ploughing on through.

And that is the thing about rain, it may be unwelcome but in its wake it leaves growth. As we meander through autumn and winter it is always good to remember that spring will be here in a breath, and with it we will see new life blossoming. The same I believe is true for our lives, that after dark or difficult times we can start to see hope, a renewal of life, a re-energising. Sometimes this means seeing life in a different context from previously, as though the time of difficulty was able to leave a path for this to take place.

When rains fall we get wet, life becomes harder, things are left damaged and it can be a far from enjoyable experience. But the rain can also leave a rainbow, produce amazing food, and create magnificent landscapes. I ask you to reflect on the hard rains that have fallen in your life and consider what growth may have followed when you look back now with the gift of time passed.

If you are going through a rainy period at this moment my prayers are with you and please know that the church door is open if you ever need an umbrella.

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Evangelism Training Course

On Friday 6th and Saturday 7th September, an Evangelism Course compiled and led by a young American, Kenny, who now lives in Bradford, was offered in church.

It was to be a great weekend as Teddy's baptism was to take place on the Sunday. As the baptistry was open, the lower hall was out of bounds [in case anyone fell in] so we were to meet in the Upper Room.

Ten of us hoped to refresh our ideas as we sat around tables and were presented with workbooks to fill in as we went along. I hope Kenny wasn't daunted as he looked around to see most of us were advanced in years. But you're never too old to learn.

I must say it was absolutely freezing, and if it had not been such a full and interesting course, I would not have returned on the Saturday, but it was and I did.

We considered how our personality influences our way of sharing faith and how the Holy Spirit leads us and equips us with boldness when the time is right. We are all called to be witnesses for Christ and we each do that in our own way. We are not all preachers or leaders, but God speaks through our own personal approach to others.

Prayer is essential, to help us be alert to God's prompting in our encounters with others. We need to prepare the Way by praying for those we come in contact with and those we are concerned about.

We do this as a church too, not only on Sundays in our Prayers of Concern, but especially in the Wednesday morning Time to Reflect.



We were encouraged to think through and be prepared to share our own personal stories of how we came to know the love of our Saviour, Jesus. We should also notice when compassion is arising within us, as that is how the Spirit leads us.

Kenny asked us to write down our personal faith histories. These are stories without end, so I suspect that most of us didn't finish. After all, God hasn't finished with any of us yet!

We particularly liked his story of the small boy at a school he visited. John mentioned God's call to Samuel, and translated Samuel's reply into modern English to be told by a small boy that Samuel's reply was actually "Speak Lord for your servant heareth," which were not the words John used.

WORDS TO PONDER

"You don't need to pray to God any more when there are storms in the sky, but you do have to be insured." Bertolt Brecht

Our words to ponder are from Bertolt Brecht, a German theatre practitioner, playwright, and poet. When the Nazis came to power in Germany in 1933, Brecht fled his home country, initially going to Scandinavia. During World War II he moved to Southern California where he established himself as a screenwriter, though unfortunately whilst there he was put under surveillance by the FBI. He later moved back to Europe, finally settling in East Berlin.

I love the comic tone in Brecht's words, but I would like us to contrast Brecht's word with those from psalm 93:3-4 (Message version)

Sea storms are up, God,
Sea storms wild and roaring,
Sea storms with thunderous breakers.
Stronger than wild sea storms,
Mightier than sea-storm breakers,
Mighty God rules from High Heaven.

Brecht points out that previously people did not understand how weather worked and would therefore pray to God for them to cease. However, sometimes life can feel like a furious storm, can't it? Those moments where all around you appears to be on the brink of calamity. The psalmist reminds us that in all things God is stronger, that God has the comfort, advice and solace that may be required.

We simply need to ask...

But there will be times where that can be the hardest thing to do. We may have felt let down by God or by Christians before, or we may simply be tired and frustrated. Whatever the circumstances, know that God is still there, waiting for you to reach out. God may not send the storms but He can provide the insurance.


